
INSTRUMENT OF DELEGATION

Information Privacy Act 2009

I, Dr Jim Watterston, Director-General of the Department of Education and Training, pursuant to section 50(2) of the *Information Privacy Act 2009*, DELEGATE to the person who is from time to time the holder of the position specified in Column 4 of Schedule 1, those powers, functions, authorities and duties, conferred or imposed on me under the provisions of the *Information Privacy Act 2009*, which are specified in Column 1 of the Schedule, subject to the limitations (if any) specified in Column 3 of the Schedule.

This Instrument of Delegation is comprised of this page and Schedule 1, comprising 3 pages. No other material forms part of the Instrument.

This Instrument of Delegation repeals and replaces any other Instrument of Delegation in respect of those powers, functions, authorities and duties, conferred or imposed on me under the provisions of the *Information Privacy Act 2009*, which are specified in Column 1 of the Schedule, subject to the limitations (if any) specified in Column 3 of the Schedule.

50(2)	<p>Decision-maker for application to agency</p> <p>(1) An access or amendment application to an agency must be dealt with for the agency by the agency's principal officer.</p> <p>(2) The agency's principal officer may delegate the power to deal with the application to another officer of the agency.</p> <p>(3) Also, for an agency other than a local government, the agency's principal officer may, with the agreement of another agency's principal officer, delegate the power to deal with the application to the other agency's principal officer.</p> <p>(4) The principal officer of the other agency may subdelegate a power delegated to him or her under subsection (3).</p> <p><i>Note—</i> Under the <i>Acts Interpretation Act 1954</i>, section 27A(2), a delegation may be revoked, wholly or partly, by the delegator.
